*<u>S6M-02070</u> Maggie Chapman: Transgender Day of Remembrance 2021—That the Parliament recognises Transgender Day of Remembrance (TDoR) on 20 November 2021, a day, which is observed annually and internationally, to memorialise trans people lost to transphobia; understands that, while the murder of trans people for being trans in the UK is rare, suicide is not; further understands that more than one in four (27%) trans young people have attempted to take their own lives, and that nine in 10 (89%) have thought about it, with 72% having self-harmed at least once; believes that the current media climate has not helped; further believes that trans people need reassurance and support, and notes calls on members to show their solidarity and support for trans people.

*<u>S6M-02109</u> Mark Ruskell: Welcoming the Beyond Oil and Gas Alliance—That the Parliament welcomes the launch of the Beyond Oil and Gas Alliance, an international coalition of governments and stakeholders working together to facilitate a managed and just phase out of oil and gas production; congratulates the co-chair countries Denmark and Costa-Rica, and the other 10 founding members for what it considers as their climate leadership in recognising that fossil-fuel phase out is essential to the goal of keeping the world within 1.5 degrees of heating, and looks forward to the Scottish Government making progress towards joining the alliance.

*<u>S6M-02098</u> Jackie Baillie: RCN Scotland Indicative Ballot Results — That the Parliament notes the Royal College of Nursing (RCN) Scotland's report on its indicative ballot of NHS Scotland members to establish who would be willing to take some form of industrial action in support of their trade dispute on pay; understands that the ballot revealed that 90% of respondents would be willing to take industrial action, short of strike, while six out of 10 members said they would be willing to withdraw their labour in strike action; further understands that this ballot is a result of the fact that RCN members rejected the Scottish Government's single-year NHS pay offer

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for 2021 and subsequently lodged a trade dispute with the Scottish Government and NHS employers over pay; believes that the results of this ballot should shame the SNP administration and considers that the results are a reflection of how badly treated and undervalued nursing staff are in Scotland; further considers that RCN members considering strike action is an historic and unprecedented event, and understands that these decisions will not have been made lightly, and urges the Scottish Government to act to give nursing staff the pay and conditions that they deserve and to apologise to the sector for the way that it has been treated.

*<u>S6M-02085</u> Pam Gosal: Dunbartonshire Chamber and Milngavie BID Shortlisted for Scotland Loves Local Award—That the Parliament acknowledges that the Dunbartonshire Chamber of Commerce and the Milngavie Business Improvement District (BID) have been recognised for their work in promoting and delivering the Scotland Loves Local campaign, to encourage consumers to shop at local businesses; believes that this will not only help small independent businesses thrive and provide local jobs, but will also encourage people to travel less, and therefore cut their carbon footprint, and wishes them the very best of luck at the inaugural Scotland Loves Local Awards.

Proposals for Members' Bills

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.

As soon as a Public Bill (i.e. a Government, Committee or Member's Bill) has completed Stage 1, amendments for consideration at Stage 2 may be lodged; and as soon as Stage 2 is completed, amendments for Stage 3 consideration may be lodged. The last lodging day for amendments at Stage 2 is four sitting days before the meeting at which those amendments will be considered (e.g. Wednesday for a meeting on Tuesday); at Stage 3 it is five days before. Amendments may be lodged until 4.30 pm on any sitting day, except on the last lodging day for each Stage, when the deadline is 12 noon.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.
