[THE CONVENER opened the meeting at 11:15]

The Convener (Mr Kenny MacAskill): Good morning. We are not expecting anyone else to come, and we have received apologies from members who cannot be here.

Air Quality (Scotland) Regulations 2000 (SSI 2000/draft)

Scotland Act 1998 (Cross-Border Public Authorities) (Forestry Commissioners) Order 2000 (SSI 2000/draft)

Housing Support Grant (Scotland) Order 2000 (SSI 2000/draft)

The Convener: The first item on the agenda is three draft affirmative instruments. Our legal briefing on the instrument on air quality is that no points arise from it. It is doubtless welcome legislation. I presume that nobody has any comments to make and that we should not make representations to any other committee.

Members indicated agreement.

The Convener: It appears that few points arise from the second instrument, on forestry commissioners. We have been advised that the matter is being scrutinised by our related committee in Westminster. Should we simply note the instrument?

Trish Godman (West Renfrewshire) (Lab): If the committee in London comes up with anything, does that make any difference to us, or do we just note what it says?

The Convener: There would not be any correlation between the two committees unless we had informal discussions beforehand on something that was felt to be a problem both here and there. Presumably, the committees could disagree on the interpretation of the instrument, and that could lead to matters becoming more involved. However, there is no overlap as such,

apart from informal contacts.

We are advised that no points arise on the final draft affirmative instrument on housing support grant. The instrument simply makes various provisions, and I think that we should simply note it.

Members indicated agreement.

National Health Service (General Medical Services) (Scotland) Amendment Regulations 2000 (SSI 2000/28)

Sea Fishing (Enforcement of Community Quota and Third Country Fishing Measures) (Scotland) Order 2000 (SSI 2000/34)

Housing Revenue Account General Fund Contribution Limits (Scotland) Order 2000 (SSI 2000/33)

Food (Peanuts from Egypt) (Emergency Control) (Scotland) Order 2000 (SSI 2000/35)

The Convener: We move on now to four negative instruments. The first concerns general medical services. We have already made representations to the Executive seeking consolidation on numerous matters in national health service regulations. However, our legal advice is that this is a matter of special urgency and that to seek consolidation might cause a delay.

lan Jenkins (Tweeddale, Ettrick and Lauderdale) (LD): Although I believe that the instrument does not breach the 21-day rule, even if it did, we should not stand on our dignity on this matter. The Dr Shipman case is relevant, and I think that we should approve the instrument.

The Convener: Yes—we do not need to go into policy; I think that we can see where the Executive is coming from, and we fully support it.

Members indicated agreement.

The Convener: No points arise from the next instrument, which simply makes provision for the enforcement of European Community legislation governing fishery quotas. Shall we simply note the instrument?

Members indicated agreement.

The Convener: Nothing arises from the housing revenue account instrument, which is a technical matter. Again, shall we simply note the instrument?

Members indicated agreement.

The Convener: The last instrument is on peanuts from Egypt. Ian Jenkins and I were talking earlier and neither of us knew that peanuts were produced in Egypt; we had assumed that they came from elsewhere in Africa. This matter breaches the 21-day rule; however, emergency legislation is required and health problems could arise unless steps are taken. The explanation for breaching the 21-day rule seems acceptable.

Members indicated agreement.

Act of Sederunt (Messengers-at-Arms and Sheriff Officers Rules) (Amendment) 2000 (SSI 2000/30)

The Convener: The third and concluding item on the agenda concerns an instrument that is not subject to parliamentary control. It has some typographical errors that can doubtless be dealt with without our needing to bring them to the attention of anyone else in the Parliament.

Members indicated agreement.

The Convener: I thank all those who came to the meeting.
