[THE CONVENER opened the meeting at 09:33]

The Convener (Alex Neil): I welcome everyone to the 18th meeting in 2002 of the Enterprise and Lifelong Learning Committee. There are a few housekeeping announcements before we move to the first item of business. Members will find a pack in front of them containing the arrangements and tickets for Shetland. David Davidson can sort out his arrangements with the clerks after the meeting.

I have received apologies from Annabel Goldie, who is still ill, and Adam Ingram, who is at the Transport and the Environment Committee, which is also meeting at 9.30 this morning. Brian Fitzpatrick missed his train but will be joining us later.

Mr David Davidson (North-East Scotland) (Con): I declare that I am the substitute member for Annabel Goldie.

The Convener: Before we move to item 1, I should congratulate England on its result this morning. Until this morning I thought that an African nation should win the world cup, but now I think that a Scandinavian nation should win it.

Rhona Brankin (Midlothian) (Lab): I object to cultural fascism in the committee. [Laughter.]

Mr Davidson: On a point of information, convener, what was the score?

The Convener: It was nil-nil.

Rhona Brankin: England goes through.

Tavish Scott (Shetland) (LD): It was dire.

Annual Report

The Convener: The first item of business is the committee's annual report. Members have a draft of the report in front of them. It seems straightforward. Are members happy with the report?

Members indicated agreement.

Local Economic Forums

The Convener: The second item is a draft letter to lain Gray on our response to the evidence from the lowland local economic forums. Are there any comments on the letter?

David Mundell (South of Scotland) (Con): I do not like it.

The Convener: Do you want to tell us why?

David Mundell: As you know, I am sceptical about the forums and have been all along. The evidence that we received did not lead me to form a different view. We are back at the situation where we must question the rationale behind LEFs. What are they attempting to achieve? If it is simply the limited objective of rationalising services to businesses, then some LEFs have succeeded and some have not. If the objective is something wider, we need a wider debate about how we are going to deal with local economic development.

The letter—without any disrespect to the person who drafted it—is wishy-washy.

Marilyn Livingstone (Kirkcaldy) (Lab): The committee will not be surprised to hear that I totally disagree with David Mundell—perhaps for the first time. The Enterprise and Lifelong Learning Committee recommended that local economic forums be set up. I realise that some forums are working better than others, but that is to be expected. We should not give up on local economic forums just because one or two are not working as well as the others. In my area and in other areas the LEF is working well. The LEFs are encouraging partnership and collaboration and we are seeing the benefits of that.

It is important that the LEFs link into the community planning process. That is highlighted in the letter. I support the draft letter and I propose that we send it as it is.

Tavish Scott: I have a brief point about the second bullet point in the letter. I do not think that taking a minimalist approach is necessarily a disadvantage. For a variety of reasons, in some bodies that are now areas the formally represented on local economic forums already have close working relationships. Diversity of approach is not a bad thing and we should not be down on those who have chosen a minimalist approach. Perhaps the sentence could be more elegantly phrased to suggest that a minimalist approach is appropriate in circumstances where the partners consider it necessary.

Marilyn Livingstone: I support that.

David Mundell: I do not want us to rehearse all the arguments about local economic forums. I am happy to dissent formally from the letter.

Mr Davidson: I, too, dissent from the letter.

The Convener: We must also stress in the letter that this is our response to the lowland local economic forums because we have not yet had a review of the Highlands and Islands local economic forums. Do members agree to send the letter with those changes?

Members indicated agreement.

The Convener: The *Official Report* will record the dissent of Mr Mundell and Mr Davidson.

We now move into private to consider two items: the preparation of a report and the shortlist of candidates for the post of committee adviser for the tourism inquiry.
