## Social care update

#### Note by the Clerk

#### Introduction

- 1. At its meeting today, the Health, Social Care and Sport Committee will take further evidence on social care in Scotland.
- 2. The Committee will hear from the Minister for Mental Wellbeing and Social Care.

## Background

- 3. Audit Scotland and the Accounts Commission published a <u>briefing on Social Care</u> in January 2022. This aimed to summarise the key challenges facing Scotland's social care sector, as identified in previous work by Audit Scotland, and progress towards addressing these.
- 4. The main challenges the briefing identifies are:
  - The importance of the service user's perspective and voice.
  - The fragility of the social care workforce.
  - Tensions between cost and quality in the commissioning of social care.
  - Instability of leadership and leaders failing to work effectively together.
  - A lack of key data, and ineffective use of existing data, to inform decisionmaking.
  - Increasing financial challenges and threats to the sustainability of services, including lack of progress in shifting resources to preventative approaches.
- 5. Providing further context for today's evidence session, the Scottish Government has recently published its <u>analysis of the consultation responses to the National</u> <u>Care Service Consultation</u>.
- 6. This session follows a previous evidence session with stakeholders from the social care sector on <u>22 February 2022.</u> This focused on addressing current

challenges facing the adult social care sector, as highlighted by Audit Scotland's briefing on Social Care.

- The Public Audit Committee took evidence from the Auditor General for Scotland on Audit Scotland's social care briefing on <u>3 March 2022</u>. It took further evidence on <u>21 April 2022</u> from:
  - Caroline Lamb, Chief Executive for NHS Scotland and Director-General for Health and Social Care;
  - Donna Bell, Director for Social Care and National Care Service Development;
  - Nicola Dickie, Director of People Policy; and
  - Sarah Watters, Director of Membership and Resources, all Scottish Government.
- 8. The Public Audit Committee wrote to the Health, Social Care and Sport Committee <u>on 5 May 2022</u> suggesting areas where the Committee might wish to undertake further scrutiny. In particular, it highlighted the following themes:
  - The pace of implementation of the briefing's recommendations
  - Funding
  - Data gaps
