Cross-Party Group Application

Introduction

- 1. In accordance with the provisions on Cross-Party Groups (CPGs) set out in section 6 of the Code of Conduct (the Code), proposals for the establishment of CPGs in the Scottish Parliament must be submitted to the Standards, Procedures and Public Appointments Committee (the Committee) for its approval.
- 2. There is one proposed Group for the Committee's consideration.

Proposed CPG on Brain Tumours

3. The registration form submitted by the proposed Group is attached at Annexe A to this note.

Consideration by the Standards, Procedures and Public Appointments Committee

4. Paragraph 18 of Section 6 of the Code states "...one of the proposed Group's MSP office bearers (usually the Convener) will be invited to attend a meeting of the Committee to explain the justification for the proposed Group." The proposed Convener Beatrice Wishart MSP will be in attendance to give evidence.

Purpose

- 5. Paragraph 19 Section 6 of the Code states "the Committee will pay particular attention to a proposed Group's purpose. If the Committee considers that a proposed Group is not in the public interest but is intended, for example, to further particular commercial interests, the proposed Group will not be accorded recognition. The Committee will also consider whether the purpose of a proposed Group overlaps the remit of an existing Group. If there is any overlap proposed Groups are asked to provide justification as to why their aims could not effectively be achieved within an existing Group".
- The stated purpose of the proposed Group is that it "Will raise awareness of the issues facing the brain tumour community in order to improve research, diagnosis, information, support, treatment and care outcomes."

Membership

7. Paragraph 8 of Section 6 of the Code requires group membership to include at least five MSPs, with at least one MSP from each of the parties or groups represented on the Parliamentary Bureau. The Committee has previously agreed that there should be a general waiver of this Rule in the current Session and Groups

are now required to have five MSPs from the majority of parties represented on the Parliamentary Bureau. The proposed Group meets this requirement.

- 8. The MSP membership (by party) of the proposed Group is as follows—

 - Colin Smyth MSP (Labour)
 - Foysol Choudhury MSP (Labour)
 - Ben Macpherson MSP (Scottish National Party)
 - Finlay Carson MSP (Conservatives)
 - Jackie Bailie MSP (Labour)
 - Jackson Carlaw MSP (Conservatives)
- 9. Paragraph 9 of Section 6 of the Code entitles groups to contain members from outwith the Parliament. The proposed Group has listed two non-MSP members in the individual category and one in the non-MSP member organisations.

Office Bearers

10. Paragraph 10 of Section 6 of the Code requires one MSP to be Convener of the Group and there to be at least one other MSP office bearer. The proposed Group meets this requirement: Beatrice Wishart MSP is the proposed Convener of this group and Colin Smyth MSP, Finlay Carson MSP and Ben Macpherson MSP are the proposed Deputy-Conveners.

Financial Benefits and Subscription

- 11. The registration form indicates that the Group anticipates secretariat support from Brain Tumour Research.
- 12. The registration form also indicates that members of the proposed Group will not be charged a subscription.

Next Steps

- 13. At agenda item 2 the Committee is invited to discuss any aspects of the application for recognition of the proposed Cross-Party Group on the Brain Tumours with Beatrice Wishart MSP.
- 14. At agenda item 3 the Committee will discuss whether to accord recognition to the proposed Group.

The Cross-Party Group will raise awareness of the issues facing the brain tumour community in order to improve research, diagnosis, information, support, treatment and care outcomes.

Brain tumours kill more children and adults under the age of 40 than any other cancer, yet historically just 1% of the national spend on cancer research has been allocated to this devastating disease.

Whilst the last 20 years has seen a revolution in our understanding of how cancer develops, options for treating brain tumours are very limited and it remains one of the deadliest forms of cancer. Substantial effort is required to change this situation.

3. Please also provide details of any overlaps with the purpose of existing Cross-Party Groups and an explanation of why, regardless of any such overlap, the Group should be established.

The Cross-Party Group on Cancer acts as a channel of communications between the Scottish Parliament and people and organisations working in cancer research, treatment, care and prevention.

Regardless of the overlaps, a Cross-Party Group on Brain Tumours is needed. Brain tumours are uniquely complex and require a different approach in many areas of cancer care to other cancers.

Moreover, brain tumour survival remains low, and has changed little in over a generation, which is why they need to be made a strategic and clinical priority, as a cancer of unmet need.
